

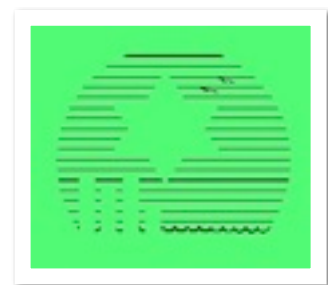

A Time to Begin Again

The Hebrew month of Elul (the thirty days before Rosh Hashanah) which begins this year on August 31, and the ten days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are days when Jews are asked to seek forgiveness from those we may, intentionally or not, have hurt; we are also asked to grant forgiveness from those who have hurt us and who request our forgiveness. Who among us hasn't wished that we could undo a certain act, or take back words that we have said? No human being is perfect. We all make mistakes that we wish we could undo.

Conventional wisdom teaches that what's done is done, and cannot be changed. However, as my colleague Rabbi Arnie Gluck points out, Jewish wisdom has a completely different take on this matter. The Torah teaches us that through tshuvah, repentance, we can transform ourselves, and wipe our slate clean. We can hit the reset button and begin again. As Rabbi Gluck writes: "We may not be able to undo what has been done, but the one who does tshuvah (repentance)



becomes a new person, a 'new creation,' different from the one who committed the offense in the past."

It is not easy to recreate oneself through tshuvah. It involves a series of steps that include recognizing one's error, confession, making reparations or restitution, asking for forgiveness, and resolving not to repeat the sin. Without complete sincerity, humility,

and resolve to change, there is no tshuvah.

While it is challenging for one to repent, it perhaps is even more difficult to grant forgiveness and to make tshuvah possible. We need to be willing to forgive, to believe that people can truly change. In order to do this, we must have faith in humanity. Maimonides emphasizes this crucial element in his Laws of Repentance when he states: "it is forbidden to remind a penitent of his former sin." Why? To do so would be to fix our image of the person as a sinner, and deny him or her the possibility of tshuvah.

When I was at the Hartman Institute this past summer we studied the last chapter of the Talmud's discussion of Yom Kippur. From the Talmud we learn that we are obligated to seek forgiveness (selichot) from those we have wronged, and they are equally required to forgive. If they are not willing to do so, we must repeat the effort three times. And if, after the third attempt, they will not be appeased, the burden of the sin is shifted to them.

After the Talmud describes this ritualized process of seeking reconciliation, it gives a series of stories that seem to undermine the process it has just given. The purpose of these stories is to help us understand that making peace is no easy matter, that human emotions are complex, and that success requires patience and humility.

We are taught that the gates of repentance are always open, that possibilities of tshuvah exist until we draw our last breath. But there is no time like the present. I urge you all to use these days of Elul and the ten days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur wisely, to think about asking for forgiveness, and also to especially think about how we each, individually and as a community, can grant forgiveness.

We all make mistakes. We hurt each other's feelings. We say and do things we regret. We make decisions we wish we had not made. We don't have to be locked in the past. We can set the reset button. May we find it in our hearts to give each other the gift of forgiveness.

May you each have a sweet New Year, a year filled with joy, blessing, good health, forgiveness and renewal. L'shanah tovah!
