SERVICES AT Temple Bat Yam: BLENDING THE FAMILIAR AND THE NEW

To sit or to stand. How to utilize the abundant rich material in Mishkan T'filah. The role of music to establish a mood and enhance a service. The use of Hebrew or English. All of these issues and more are discussed and debated when Cheryl, Phyllis, and I discuss our weekly Friday night services. What emerges may be a new melody for a familiar prayer, a new reading from Mishkan T'filah, or a new service outline.

The goal is to blend the familiar and the new, and encourage the congregation to participate, each in his or her own way. Music is an important part of our service. It



is our hope that every congregant will sing (even if you have a terrible voice--we don't care)! We begin with a niggun--a wordless melody--to get everyone into the mood of services, and to bring the congregation gently from conversation and the busyness of the week to a place of calmness, a place to find joy and introspection, a place to be together in community. When we sing together, even hum together the niggun, we begin to bring a sense of community into the sanctuary.

The adoption of Mishkan T'filah has had a significant impact on our services at Temple Bat Yam. Over the past couple years we have gotten more comfortable with the prayerbook, and have learned different ways to use it, depending on the kind of service we want to craft. It has been a fine line to walk, to use new material and combine it with material which was comfortable to everyone because it was found in our old prayerbook, Gates of Prayer. Our goal is to create a sense of vibrancy, a sense of enthusiasm and joy, and we want to balance that with moments of quietness and time for introspection and private prayer.

Sometimes we use melodies that we have used for years, at other times we like to introduce new melodies. There is so much new music being written by talented and creative Jewish musicians. We want our congregation to learn and come to love the new, as well as to find comfort with the traditional melodies.

Just as we try to balance old and new music, we also strive for a balance in the amount of Hebrew we incorporate in the service. Mishkan T'filah has the transliterations as well as the translations of the prayer on the same page. The transliterations make it possible for everyone to participate in the reading of Hebrew. And if a congregant does not wish to read the Hebrew, they can let their eye wander across the page--to the translation or to the many creative readings on the essence of the prayer.

After speaking with many of my colleagues I realize that we at Temple Bat Yam are very much in line with other Reform congregations in the Hebrew we incorporate in our services. I believe it is important we learn some of the basic prayers in Hebrew. Hebrew is the language of Judaism, it is the language we share with every congregation---Orthodox, Conservative, Reform---around the world. Wherever we go to services we can participate and feel part of the Jewish people. And what I have heard from congregants at TBY is that after they have heard the prayer repeated for a few weeks it becomes easy to participate.

We try hard to create a meaningful service for each of our congregants. A little old, a little new, a little Hebrew, a lot of music, a thought-provoking reading, traditional prayers, some celebration, some quiet. If you haven't been lately, come join us for our Shabbat celebration.

The Jewish Valentine's Day Tu B'Av

One of the least known, but perhaps most joyous, holidays in the Jewish calendar occurs on the 15th day of Av in Hebrew. It begins on Friday August 3, 2102. In Israel it is called Chag HaAhava or the Festival of Love in Hebrew. It is a kind of Jewish Valentine's Day and is considered in Israel to be a favorable day for marriage, romantic dates and proposals. It is considered a "national love day" for singles. Matchmaking online and offline are the order of the day. Wedding celebrations are found in every nook and cranny of the country.

The Talmud gives many explanations and historical reasons for the celebration of Tu B'Av. One of them is that on this day the Biblical tribes of Israel were permitted to mingle with each other, namely to marry women from other tribes. In earlier times the young single women would go out to the fields dressed in white. Then the men would come down to the fields to pick a bride. This was a day for flirting and attraction. **HAPPY VALENTINES DAY!**

Shabbat Across America

On Friday evening, **March 2**, Temple Bat Yam will for the first time take part in Shabbat Across America. There will be a congregational Shabbat dinner that night along with a very special Shabbat service. We encourage all members of TBY to attend dinner and services that evening. As the date draws closer, information about reserving a seat at the Shabbat dinner will be sent to all members over the TBY email distribution list.

The organizers of SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA hope that the day will soon come when every American Jew will be invited to his/her local synagogue or Jewish center, to celebrate a joyous Shabbat together with thousands of rejuvenated Jews. They look forward to the day when massive public celebrations of Shabbat will take place--eating, singing, studying and rejoicing together as a united people--creating a national momentum of belonging and yearning for Jewish growth and enrichment. The organizers pray that SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA will usher in a joyous era of Jewish return that will capture the hearts and imaginations of our people, so that not a single American Jewish man or woman, boy or girl, will be able to say--you abandoned me, you didn't care!

SHABBAT ACROSS AMERICA (SAA) is an evolution of the acclaimed Turn Friday Night Into Shabbat (TFNIS) program first developed at Lincoln Square Synagogue in 1980. The original TFNIS program was designed to give the millions of unaffiliated North American Jews, who have little or no connection to Jewish life, a 'taste of Shabbat.' The program includes an interactive and exciting Shabbat prayer service and a joyous Shabbat dinner, replete with singing, dancing, explanations and discussion. As of January 1997, about 65,000 North American Jews have been introduced to Shabbat through the TFNIS program. Building on the success of Turn Friday Night Into Shabbat, the renamed Shabbat Across America program has been repackaged to reflect the excitement of the nationwide "Take Your Daughter to Work Day" and "Hands Across America" programs. SAA is part of NJOP's ambitious marketing campaign to "Let Our People Know," predicated on the assumption that Jews who learn about Jewish tradition in a joyous and positive manner, will choose to be part of Jewish communal life.

So, please set aside the date and join us at TBY for this very special, once-a-year dinner and service, and please bring with you any friends, Jewish or otherwise, affiliated or non-affiliated, so that they can also enjoy this very special dinner and service. It should be an enjoyable evening for all in attendance.

Bat Yam Mensch of the Month

For the last two years the community has awarded the Hal Glick Distinguished Service Award to an honor a person who has given generous service to the community. The first person to receive this award was Hal Glick. This month Hal Glick is Bat Yam's Mensch of the Month.

Hal's family for over a period of 100 years owned a haberdashery shop in Baltimore. Hal's grandfather opened a shop in Onancock, Virginia on the eastern shore of Virginia. The shop passed to Hal's father and mother. Hal grew up there and then graduated the University of Maryland and passed the C.P.A. exam.

After college he came home to operate the store Onancock. Hal took over the shop and later with his brother opened another shop in Salisbury called Mike Hals Limited. He operated the shop for 13 years.

In 1979 he joined the real estate office of Warfield and Moore. He became a partner in 1983. The firm became one of the largest real estate firms in Ocean City until it was bought out by Caldwell Banker.

The temple and Jewish faith were always important to him. His dedication to local charitable organizations was important to his father and mother and he continued the tradition. Not only has he been extremely philanthropic he has devoted a lot of time to many local organizations.

He was the youth leader at Bat Yam. He was president of Bat Yam for 4 years and now serves on the Board of Directors of Bat Yam. Hal and his wife Chris live in Bishopville. They have two children Lauren and Shawn and six grandchildren. He is enjoying retirement with his grandchildren and family. Hal has been quoted "It's always been important to me to give back to the community and help people where I can help them." This is the legacy of Hal Glick.

Washington Museums Springtime Visits

A bus trip to three exceptional Washington museums is scheduled for Sunday, **March 25, 2012**. Participants will have a choice to visit one or more of the sites -- the Holocaust Memorial Museum or the Newseum or the International Spy Museum.

Sponsored by the Men's Club of Temple Bat Yam visitors to the three destinations will share the same bus on the trip from the Ocean City / Ocean Pines area to Washington, D.C. Each passenger will share in the cost of the bus, but will be responsible for the own admissions to the museums.

A charge of \$40.00 per person will be required for the round trip bus ride which will leave at 9 a.m. at the Temple Bat Yam parking lot on Worcester Highway, one-half mile south of Racetrack Road. The bus will return sometime after 9 p.m. that day.

Participants will be responsible for admission to the museums. There is no charge for the Holocaust Memorial Museum, but reservations are needed in advance by calling 202-488-0400. The Newseum charges \$21.95 for adults, \$17.95 for seniors, \$12.95 for 7 to 18 year-olds and no charge for children under 6. The museum offers a discount for advance online purchases. The Spy Museum charges \$18 for adults, \$17 for seniors, \$15 for 5 to 15 year olds and no charge for children under 5.

The bus will make stops at each location arriving approximately at Noon and will pickup each group around 5 p.m. at their specific locations at the end of the day. Times and location for pickups will be announced on the bus. There will be a dinner/snack stop on the Eastern Shore on the way back.

Reservations are required from everyone interested in the trip. Non-members of the temple are welcome; members will be given preference if paid by the deadline. Reservations should be made early to guarantee bus seats.

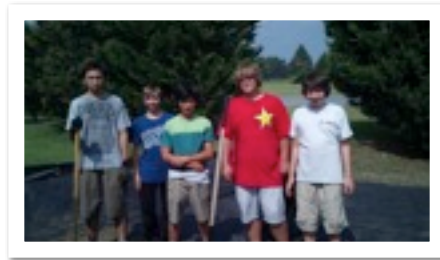
